While most teachers rated this parameter as good (46.15%), 23.07% felt it was merely satisfactory or adequate, indicating a need for review.

1. Strengths:


- Administrative support (69.23% excellent).

- o ICT facilities, while generally good, had fewer excellent ratings (38.46%).

Recommendations:

- Reassess Lecture Allotments: Evaluate the adequacy of lectures per course and adjust schedules if needed to enhance coverage.
- 2. **Improve Library Resources:** Address gaps in the availability of prescribed books by expanding the collection of both textbooks and reference materials.
- 3. Enhance ICT Support: Invest in upgrading ICT infrastructure and provide training to maximize utility.

- A majority of students rated the curriculum and syllabus as Good (30) and Excellent (25).
- The syllabus providing sufficient elective options received a mixed response, with a significant portion marking it as **Good** (30).
- While 24 students rated the specification of course objectives as Excellent, 26 rated it Satisfactory.
- The effectiveness of attaining course objectives was largely seen as Good (30).
- There is room for improvement in how the syllabus facilitates professional skill development, with only 21 marking it as Excellent.

- Hostel Facility and Career Guidance and Placement were areas of concern, receiving the highest number of Adequate ratings (26 and 28, respectively).


Summary of Key Areas for Improvement:





- o Improvement: +11 marks

The focused sessions on grammar, vocabulary, and writing skills significantly contributed to Shubhangi's improved performance.

2. Shristy Suman

- o Subject: General Principles of Political Science
- First Semester Score: 28
- Second Semester Score: 47
- o Improvement: +19 marks

Through remedial classes, Shristy gained a better understanding of key political concepts, analytical frameworks, and theoretical applications.

3. Amisha

- o Subject: Law of Crimes
- o First Semester Score: 34
- o Second Semester Score: 46
- o Improvement: +12 marks

Targeted discussions on case laws, legal principles, and practical problemsolving enabled Amisha to improve her comprehension and application of criminal law.

The smaller student-to-teacher ratio in remedial classes allows for individual attention, enabling educators to address specific challenges faced by each student.

4. Bridging Knowledge Gaps

Students with varied academic backgrounds may struggle with foundational gaps. Remedial classes focus on bridging these gaps, ensuring that all students can keep pace with the curriculum.

The substantial improvement in the academic performance of Shubhangi Verma, Shristy Suman, and Amisha demonstrates the effectiveness of the remedial classes program. 




